

## 39. Persuasive Witnessing

"The wise in heart will be called understanding, and sweetness of speech increases persuasiveness ... The heart of the wise instructs his mouth and adds persuasiveness to his lips." Proverbs 16:21-23

Effective witnessing involves the heart, mind, and lips. A wise heart understands the needs of a non-believer. The wise believer witnesses with sweetness of speech ... adding "persuasiveness to his lips."

Paul pursued and persuaded nonbelievers. And "He went to them ... reasoned with them from the Scriptures ... explaining and giving evidence ... and some of them were persuaded," ... those are Paul's words from Acts 17:2-4. And "He was reasoning in the synagogue every Sabbath and trying to persuade Jews and Greeks," Acts 18:4. Paul wrote of himself and of

his co-laborers, "Therefore, knowing the fear of the Lord, we persuade men," 2 Corinthians 5:11.

Paul witnessed to King Agrippa. The king replied, "In a short time you will persuade me to become a Christian," Acts 26:28. And Paul went so far as to beg others to be saved ... writing, "Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, as though God were making an appeal through us; we beg you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God," 2 Corinthians 5:20. Some Christians offer the Gospel as a turn-or-burn, repent-or-be sent, get-right or get-left-out message. However, witnessing should not be rude, crude, and obnoxious. Biblical witnessing comes from a wise heart ... and from sweet, persuasive lips. What's your witnessing style? Could someone say to you, "In a short time you will persuade me to become a Christian"? Be persuasive with the Gospel ... and then be more persuasive. And if necessary, beg someone to be saved.

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
